My wife and I were just twenty-nine when we bought it in 1970 from a talented young architect, Harold Bexton, who had reconstructed the house before moving on to a fine career in California. He had eliminated the interior walls, devised a drop ceiling and installed hardwood flooring to create a full, open-plan, ground-floor living space before that concept became fashionable.

In about 2000 it was time to upgrade the house and we followed one of my wife's guiding principles: "Go for the best - you often regret an economy, but never regret an extravagance". So we hired the imaginative architect, Andrew Volgyesi, and Downsview Kitchens, picked topbrand appliances, and installed rich dark-green marble in the vestibule, the kitchen and the bathroom.
